Now to try and answer that question "Where do I Fit in ??"

a.....Line...... The best place to start is by looking at the "Overall Family Tree" which is shown in

Appendix 1..You will see 16 vertical "Lines." These are the "Lines" represented in our Society..First establish which "Line" you are on..This is fairly easily done by asking older relatives what "Line" they are on..

b......Generation......The next thing to establish is which "Generation" you belong to...
The "Generations" are allocated a letter, beginning with an "A" for Alexander WAUGH DD (1754-1827) and his brother Thomas WAUGH (1750-1820), a "B" for their children and so on...

Using Markeeta as an example....she is Reeve WAUGH's grandchild...Reeve is a Generation "F" so Markeeta is a Generation "H"....Reeve knows he is an "F" generation because his grandfather..Reeve WAUGH (1853-1945) is shown on the "Overall Family Tree" as the head of one of our 16 "Lines" and has the ID of D15.. "Dorrigo" Reeve is 2 generations on and so is "F"... c......Personal ID.....Now you know your Line and Generation, you can find your personal ID, by looking it up one of the "Lotus Lists" for your particular Line....Odd numbers denote a direct descendant, even numbers their spouses or partners. These Lists were created by myself, with information provided by many people...Their names are recorded at the head of the two main Lists..AUSWILL.WK1 and AUSALEX.WK1 which are 2 spreadsheets on Lotus 123 Ver. 2.1...I found many people who had a considerable knowledge of their own immediate family, and usually 2 or 3 generations of antecedents. In 1994 I started contacting these people, as a first step to organising the Waugh Family Reunions held in 1996 at Port Macquarie and Tenterfield. One contact would give me a lead to another and so I got "leads" to other family members as I went along. There are now over 2,700 descendants on these Lotus Lists, every one with a unique ID. The relationship of any individual to any other individual is easily derived from them. No money was ever paid by me, or to me, for information gathered in this search for descendants, and I never did do any research on the Internet, although quite possibly some of my contributors did this..

The 2 main Lotus Lists are too bulky to be reproduced in their entirety here, but I have extracted the descendants of William Alexander (Harvey) WAUGH (1849-1901) D13 (Line 6) and put them in Appendix 3 to this Newsletter.

Any descendant on this line can quickly find their ID by looking at the appropriate Generation on this list. I hope to issue a "Lotus List" of each Line progressively with these Newsletters..

d......Relationships.......Now you know which "Line" you are on, which Generation you are, and your ID, how do you work out your relationship to any other family member ??

Firstly find out who your 1st common ancestor (CA) is and then use the chart which follows the "Tree".. As an example I will show the process of determining my own relationship to Neville MALONEY....I am on Line 10 ("Jack" WAUGH) with ID of F53 and Neville, with ID of F957, is on Line 4 (Alexander William WAUGH Line) Following the "Overall Family Tree" upwards it can be seen that our 1st Common Ancestor is Thomas WAUGH (1706-1783)...We are both 6 generations on from this Common Ancestor...A, B, C, D, E, F....Turning now to the "Cousin Who?" chart and counting down 6 places on each side, it can be seen that we are 5th cousins!! Some people scoff at this sort of a relationship, claiming that it is so distant that it is unimportant...I am not one of these people!! Neville and I have found that we have a great deal in common, and whether it be friendship, or kinship, or a mixture of both...we greatly enjoy each other's company...I remember years ago talking to Reeve about this aspect and Reeve gave me some good advice as usual !!...."Forget entirely about whether someone is a 4th or 5th cousin two or three times removed...they are COUSINS Ron!! just call them "COUSIN"!!" very good advice indeed!!

Origin of the Society.....

This Society really had it's genesis in 1994 when I visited my 2nd cousin Rosemary Waugh (F7) (actually my double 2nd cousin, as her grandfather Reeve (D15), was my grandfather Jack's (D23) 's brother, and her grandmother Mollie, (nee Schrader) was my grandmother Louisa's sister) at Taloumbi Station near Maclean on the mouth of the Clarence River in Northern NSW..My mother grew up on Taloumbi along with 5 brothers and sisters and 6 cousins...the children of the 2 partners in Taloumbi...Reeve and Jack WAUGH (D15,D23)...Some of my earliest memories are of my mother telling me stories about her (apparently) idyllic childhood days growing up on Taloumbi...I really enjoyed my stay with Rosemary and as I was leaving she said "Have you met Reeve WAUGH at Dorrigo ??" I said I had heard of him, but never met him, so she told me how to find his place and said "look him up on the way back to Tamworth". This I did and we got on famously...Reeve was not long back from a family reunion at Nymboida, of his mother's family, and as we talked the idea of a similar function for the Waugh Family took shape. One thing led to another and the 2 Reunions at Tenterfield and Port Macquarie in 1996 were the result. At the Port Macquarie Reunion a meeting was held on the morning after the dinner and it was agreed that a Family Society should be formed. Last year at Armidale the first Meeting of the Society was held..

### 2. AWFS meeting at Armidale Bowling Club....Sat. 28th October 2000...

Response so far to the call for registrations for this meeting has been fairly slow but with 3 months to go, acceptances should pick up...It was much the same last year with most acceptances coming in as the date grew closer and personal committments became clearer.. 
From Neville MALONEY...Bangalow NSW..dated 29/1/2000..



Ed.. Thankyou Merron for your news...Merron also enclosed an article by a Father Dobson, headed "Individual Greatness" which I feel is well worth including in this newsletter...It reads as follows..

"Autobiographies are stories of incredible courage, of unique events in life, of passionate love and tragic sadness.

It is my experience that these elements are mingled in every life, and that people do respond with extraordinary courage, dedication, and passion to the events of their life that are both joyous and tragic.

Bert Facy saw himself as a very ordinary person.

He did the ordinary things of growing up, going through the normal development stages, meeting the girl he would marry, and then raising a family, earning a living to support that family and then growing happily into old age.

Bert kept a diary, a journal of his life and he did this from no other motivation than to record the story of his life so that his family, his children and eventually grand-children would know something of the life he led..He thought the matter would end there!!

When his family read the story they realised what an extraordinary life that Bert lived..

Consequently, it was a short step then to realise that this story should be told in a wider arena and consequently Bert's story was published under the title of "A Fortunate Life".

In Bert's story he overcame incredible difficulties in growing up and in the living out of his life, but with a deep sense of gratitude he always saw his life as a most fortunate one!..

It is now history that the book was published and went on to be a best seller, and is still selling very well to-day.

I am sure Bert himself would have been highly surprised at the success of his life story because he only saw it as an ordinary life, a fortunate life, and not a life that could well be the subject of a best seller, or a life that anybody else would be overly interested in reading!!

As I reflect on nearly thirty years of priesthood, living and working with people in the close intimacies of their lives, I have come to the conviction that it is not just Bert Facey who would be surprised to realise that the content of his life story in fact is a best seller, but I now believe that every single person is a best selling story that simply has to be written down and published!! v. live in a world of achievement and wonder..

We have lived in an era where people have died from appendicitis to almost taking for granted the most delicate and extreme medical surgery and processes that can enhance life itself.

And yet I am convinced the real wonder of life is not just what medicine can do for the body, but rather what people do with their own lives , that ultimate power of the human personality and life itself.

We seem to think the best selling stories are stories of incredible courage, of unique events in life, of passionate love and tragic sadness.

It is my experience that these elements are mingled in every life, and that people do respond with extraordinary courage, dedication, passion to the events of their life that are both joyous and tragic.

Often when I am preparing a family to celebrate the funeral of someone in the family who was much loved, I am given the privilege of reading their diaries..

I am always aware when I read these documents that in fact I am reading the basis of yet another best seller!!

The sad thing is that like Bert Facey, few people seem to see their life as something extraordinary, the basis of a best seller, or even something that other people would be interested in.

It is true that our world has made extraordinary advances in our own time, advances that are unparalleled in the total history of humanity, but the real advances are not so much about the splitting of the atom, but are those heroic stories of people who bring that limitless energy of life to bear on the joys and difficulties of the lives they lead.

This to me is a powerful form of education in the business of life, and it is only a small step for each of us to realise that the telling of our story would make a great contribution to this often difficult business of life !!..

Whether you individually write your life story or not, I think all of us need an appreciation of the greatness of our own lives, the ability we all have to motivate that endless spirit..'

- 5. Food...Sort of Smorgasbord on each table...cold...no pudding..just chocs & tea or coffee...Port ?? Choice of ham, chicken, beef and plenty of crusty bread and butter!!
- Ed...Well there's no doubt my big sister Mollie likes to keep me up to the mark !! I'll comment on her suggestions in turn and if any member feels strongly enough about the suggestions/comments then please either give me a ring or write with your views....
- 1. I think this is a particularly good idea...I thought I was being pretty bold last reunion when I set the price for children at \$10 only, but Mollie is proposing to take this a bit further...Our Society will only grow if younger descendants join and participate..Those parents who bring their children along are helping this to happen, and I believe they should be given every encouragement..The Society is in a very sound position at present (See Financial Report) and we do not have any major worthwhile projects on which to spend this surplus cash. - 2. some advice as to what to do. That evening we went to see grand-daughter **Kate** dance in the end of year concert at the Schonell Theatre at the University, which was also good but you will see why we need an occasional siesta!.

All our children and their families have enjoyed a good year with pleasures outweughing pains enough to hope for an even better year for all of them next year. Andrew and Beverly (Ed. G71,G72) moved into their new house at Cornubia and having sold their old house they can now get on with creating a real garden. We have told Mark and Lindy (Ed.G70,G69) that their garden is rapidly approaching "open" status. Meredith (Ed. G67) has lashed out with modernization and refurbishment of her Palm Beach home. Tony and Elizabeth (Ed. G76,G75) have moved to a nice little place opposite the Police Station in River St. and are now developing an edible garden!

The group was mainly 20-30 year old young people from Europe and Japan..They were a lovely group of people and a credit to their generation..

We then had two days in Alice Springs where we hired bikes and visited the Desert Park bird and animal park. This is excellent and recommended by David Attenborough. We also enjoyed delicious "native tucker" - fish, kangaroo, crocodile, buffalo with marvellous herbs and spices. We also had two days at Ross River Homestead where they had a lovely swimming pool, camel rides into the outback, boomerang throwing, whip cracking, billy tea and damper, marvellous views for sunrise and sunsets over the rugged red hills and fascinating gorges and bird life. While we were there was the first National conference on Aboriginal men's health, held at the near by camp site..

The six day camping trip took us to Kakadu national park where we had a boat trip and saw one crocodile kill another crocodile, marvellous scenery, bird life and aboriginal paintings. We also swam in (croc free) lagoons and water holes and camped with the sounds of birds and marsupials at night. We had a boat trip up Katherine gorge and Lilian had two helicopter rides over it.

I have also been running workshops round Australia, mainly in NSW and VIC..I am hoping to spend less time and money attending conferences now that my book is available to explain Tuohy-Main Systems..

This year Ron finished contract work with the Dept. Land & Water Conservation and became a permanent employee,,, This is quite a bonus as he receives a decent wage and can organise flexi-time, so he can join in Lilian's activities when I am away,, He has managed to fit in a few games of golf with work colleagues, some fishing and keeps fit with reasonably regular bike riding to and from work.

Lilian has had a busy year with dancing, swimming, choir and Brownies..All the activities gather momentum at the end of the year with dance concerts and carols. I have been well occupied sewing sequins on 4 dance costumes..

We now have two frog ponds in the garden and at least one frog is sighted almost daily. I have joined SOFAR, the Society for frogs and reptiles (or words to that effect) so that I can find out more about the frogs and assist them to proliferate in our area. The goldfish in a large garden pot with fountain, have reproduced and some of them will be given away as Christmas presents. The ducks have produced 6 ducklings which have been a source of pleasure for all of us, and children in Lilian's class when I took 3 into school last week.

The garden is full of native plants and looking very natural, but still requires quite a bit of work to keep the natural look without it turning into a jungle!..Visitors from overseas have commented it is like living in a bird aviary staying at our house, as birds are calling morning noon and night..

Ron's parents Jim and Joan are coming for a few days over Christmas, and Christmas day we will spend with Ron's brother Jeff and family close by in Merewether...This will be the first Xmas for about 10 years that I have not had an ongoing video script or book to be written so I am

already discovering the delights of spending more time with the family, Xmas shopping, present wrapping etc..

We all managed to get up to Lismore and Coff's Harbour for a brief holiday in July. Apart from catching up with friends and relatives the highlight of our trip would have to be catching heaps of fish at Coff's for the boys and whale watching for the girls.

I will be off to Oberon in January and then back to Coonamble in February for locums with a break during the last week of January. To date the locum work has allowed us to pay our bills, and with Robyn's pay we have kept the loan covered and family fed.

Only God knows what the future holds, but at this stage it will either be a move sometime in the New Year, or hopefully enough work to get the kids through uni and a regular hours job for Robyn. Anyway that will all be news for next Christmas. 'Til then we are still at "Swan Swamp" enjoying the views and creating a family home and garden, so please feel free to call in and share with us if you need a bed or a bit of company.

"Jack was the son of Mary WAUGH (D351). A courageous woman who brought up 8 children on her own after her husband died when Jack, the youngest. and only boy, was just 4 years old He was a great-grandson of "Aussie" William WAUGH. (B51). William married Francis Thorpe (the daughter of John Oxley), and their son, Alexander William WAUGH (C175) was Mary's father and hence Jack's grandfather.  It was my Dad's interest in family history that inspired and drove me to extend my knowledge of our family links, it was from these research trips that we undertook, that we met many of the "Waugh" family. Although he was never well enough to attend the reunions there was a joy in reporting the news of the wider family to him after I attended them. It was his enthusiasm that kept me going and it was to him that I dedicated the "Waugh family history book". With glasses on and magnifying glass in hand he pored over the pages and made all the work worthwhile.  Like many of his generation he endured the depression of the 1930's and the long hard hours of work labouring on farms. His experiences as a soldier in WW2, he was in an infantry battalion in New Guinea for a time, left him a legacy of memories, that no doubt, were a mixture of excitement and regret. Jack was well known in his home town of Murwillumbah and not least of all because for most of his working life after the war, he was a chef at the largest cafe in town, the AustralAt his funeral his niece Marie Melski encapsulated his character in her eulogy when she said "he called a spade a spade".

Mollie (sister) and Phil Smith drove up from Sydney, Jim (brother) and Joan came from Nelson Bay and I was there too... It was a very happy occasion for everyone with plenty of grandkids there as well as we oldies. The 3 boys all gave speeches, and in the middle of the festivities their sister Mary rang from America. All 3 boys spoke well, but Tim had prepared his speech on his computer, and I managed to get a copy... it's well worth reproducing here...quote...

"I would first like to express my sincere thanks to my parents for the love and support they have given me over the past 45 years. In particular Mum & Dad have always put the needs of their children first, and have made many sacrifices to ensure that David, Mary, myself and Ben received the best possible education and start to our lives.

As you are aware "life on the land " has never been easy...and it is characterised by hard physical work, isolation and financial pressures. These experiences have forged the character and values of the "Bow Glen" Gardiner family..Let me now share some of my childhood memories, reflecting on some of the circumstances that surround Mum and Dad's life. These thoughts are based on the letters of their Christian names..

#### WALTER

**W**.....is for World War 11, wheat farming and water...that precious resourse Dad said we couldn't waste when we were kids..

A.....is for attitude, ability and actions..

Dad truly believes in the Protestant work ethic...and there were always jobs to be done on the farm! I remember at an early age helping Dad milking the "Hereford" cows, separating the cream, feeding the pigs and then after school, getting the cows in, locking up the calves, feeding out the hay etc. etc. Probably the worst job was picking up rocks. On Sundays however, Dad always insisted that we "have a day of rest"- and this would give me a chance to tinker with old lawn mower engines, build billy carts and cubby houses..

L.....is for Lodge, the Land and the Lifestyle

These are the things that have inspired Dad to continue on, when most people in similar circumstances would have given up. Dad often refers to life on "Bow Glen" as the "Garden of Eden" producing his own wheatmeal porridge, bread, fruit, milk, butter honey and vegetables..

T......is for tenacity and truthfullness (and you thought I was going to say "terrible, touchy, temper"!!) (Ed. even Walter laughed here !!) T is also for "Ten Cents". the amount Dad would pay us to chip 100 thistles, and we had plenty of them on our prickle farm.

E......is for enterprise, effort and education..

Dad always encouraged us to do our very best at school, work and play..

R.....is for remember....

Remember rithmatic revision,
roos, rabbits and rifles,
repairing rusty ringlock,
rolling rocks and the recked rugby.

### KATHLEEN (now it's Mum's turn)

K......is for kooking, kleening and krazy kats. (spelling was never my strong point). Mum always seemed to have more krazy kats living under our house than anyone else I knew. Occasionally my older brother David (then a university veterinary student) would decide to kastrate or kull some of the kats much to Mum's konsternation.

A.....is for artistic appreciation and apricots.

We always seemed to have buckets and buckets of them to pick, peel and preserve - not to mention the other fruits grown including peaches, nectarines, pears, apples, mulberries, passionfruit, grapes, oranges, lemons and figs.

T.....is for toiling, toffee and temperature

I remember Mum toiling in the kitchen, preserving peaches in the middle of summer with the slow combustion stove cranked up on high - if it was 110 degrees outside, it would have been 130 in the kitchen. Our fibro house didn't have air conditioning or insulation.

H.....is for hand-me-downs, hot dinners and hard yacca.

Holidays were few and far between for Mum. Occasionally we would visit her family in Sydney, including Aunty Mollie and Uncle Phil at Mosman and Aunty Lou at Regent's park - where we would catch up with our city cousins. Mum would love going to the beach - she was much more capable than Dad when it came to swimming.

L.....is for laughter, love, and loyalty..

Mum would like to be reminded of such things..

### E.....is for energy

Mum always seemed to be busy doing things for others. In those days, she didn't have the labour saving devices that make housework easier today - and our filthy farm clothes covered with grease, oil and the sticky black "Merriwa" mud made this task even more difficult.

### E.....is also for endurance and exercise.

I'm sure Mum got her fair share, especially the times we would be having a relaxing Sunday afternoon picnic down possum springs, and after lunch we would decide to hike to the Goulburn River and back (a 12km trek in searing heat, swishing bush flies and stepping over snakes. That was our idea of entertainment.

**N.**....is for nurse.....the career Mum chose before she married Dad. N is also for never, as quoted from the Bible....."Never will I leave you, Never will I forşake you "

I am sure it has been both Mum and Dad's combined Christian faith that has kept them together, despite the hardships, isolation and illness. And today we celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary - a tremendous achievement, and one that makes us all proud...



COUSIN WHO?

Have you ever wondered what is meant by the term, Ist cousin, once removed? Or exactly who is a second cousin, Dad's 1st cousin or Mum's 1st cousin's children? Well wonder no more, by using the chart above, you can plot exactly how you are related to anyone in your family.

#### HOW TO USE THE CHART

Note that the two upper columns are heavily outlined; these are the Common Ancestor (CA) and his/her descendants. By following columns 1 from each side of the chart until they meet, we enter the B square, showing the sons of the CA

are brothers/sisters. Follow columns 2, they will meet at 1C, indicating that the CA's grandsons are 1st cousins — and so on down — g-grandsons = 2C (2nd cousins).

Example: You want to find the relationship between yourself and a distant relation. You are 8 generations and your relative is 6 generations from the CA. To determine your exact relationship, simply follow column 8 on one side of the chart and column 6 on the other until they meet at 5C 2R, meaning that you are 5th cousins, twice removed.
