

Nancy Fox (one of Frances' 1469 known descendants) contacted Jim Flynn, the local stonemason and received a quote as follows...

Completely Clean Waugh monument.....\$82.50 (inc. GST)

To supply a brass plaque 180mm * 150mm and fix to a concrete desk to existing monument.

Total Price including GST.....\$247.50

Inscription.....FRANCES WAUGH

daughter of John Oxley. Surv - Gen. NSW 1812

Erected by Waugh Family Society

Upon receipt of this quote from Nancy I rang Margaret Hedley at Wagga Wagga (another of Frances' descendants) and told her, as she had previously indicated that she and her family wanted to help get this done...I told her that the total cost of both jobs would be \$330. Margaret said that sounded very reasonable and offered to pay for it herself...I thought that was a very generous offer, but said that the Society would be quite prepared to meet half the cost..Margaret didn't want that at all, and said she would send me a cheque for \$330 the next day..I didn't argue and sure enough within a few days Margaret's cheque arrived..It is now in the Society account awaiting the completion of the job by the stonemason..Many thanks Margaret once again for your generosity...

I well recall several years ago, when our Society was struggling to get established...we were sending out Newsletters to everyone who attended those first two Reunions at Tenterfield and Port Macquarie in 1996..Our funds were desperately low and I reported this in a Newsletter, asking for financial support, to the extent of \$10 per family per year...Margaret sent me \$100 no strings attached, and I knew then, that with members like this, the Society would not fold...and it hasn't...

One of the highlights this year was a trip to Alaska and Canada in May. Two of my friends, Lilly and Lilian, and I went on a cruise from Vancouver to Juneau, Skagway, Glacier Bay & Ketchikan. The ship, The Niew Amsterdam, was very nice. We had cabins on the upper promenade deck with picture windows, so early in the morning when it was too cold, we could still look at the view. Much has changed, not all for the best, too many people really, though most of the inspiring grandeur of trhe gorge and environment is untouched by a mere couple of decades! **Lloyd M**. and **Ian** visited the Rock Hole at dawn to share with some platypus the solitude. Walking is starting to get quite a bit harder, especially when 50 stairs become 350 or more rough ones (one way) for one trip on one day.

It is now not repairable so appropriate passages are chosen for each recipient from each state when awards are made. Frances has verses from the Psalms, in the printing and order of that time. Elizabeth Macquarie convened the meeting in 1817 at which the Bible Society was formed. She was here as the wife of Governor Lachlan Macquarie. It is the first time these awards have been made.

She trains in asquad for an hour twice a week at the University pool, and is a member of the Central Newcastle Swimming cluband swims competitively on Friday nights. She has moved up from D grade to B grade since last year and seems to do PB's (personal bests) in swimming carnivals. She has three other friends who also train with her and they seem to spur each other on. They are working towards doing well in the school swimming gale next term.

I keep fit with swimming, body blitz and new body classes at the gym (!) and gardening and looking after the ducks at the top of the garden.

We have managed to have at least 10 camping week-ends away with friends this year. Sometimes there are 30 of us in a group. The children range from 5 to 11 and we have had lots of fun walking, cycling, canoeing, sailing, and shooting rapids as well as surfing and swimming in the sea, lakes, rivers, streams, and estuaries and swimming pools. (Ed.I don't think you've missed any Kate !!) We also had four days at the National folk festival and met up with friends there too. There are excellent dance workshops and balls, poetry, music, dance displays, street theatre and a wide range of children's activities and inexpensive food. We camp there too and take bikes to cycle round Canberra and visit the museums. We plan to go to the festival in 2001 too.

Next year Lilian will have dance lessons on a Saturday afternoon, so we will look into doing day walks on Sundays with the Newcastle Bush Walking Club, but still fit in some camping. We spent last week-end at the Club's annual camp, which was excellent. We borrowed Ron's brother's boat and joined others at Tickerabit camp on the Myall Lakes. We had a sheep roast (2) on Saturday evening and otherwise enjoyed water activities in and on the Lake and socialised. There were plenty of sea eagles, black swans, cignets, pelicans, and hawks round the lake, and goannas and wild ducks wandering nonchalantly through the camp. The boat added a new dimension to camping, allowing us to have a secluded camp in a natural, peaceful environment.

When in England in September, Ron did the Coast to Coast walk across England from St. Bees to Whitby, while Lilian and I enjoyed about two weeks with my father and brother Thomas in the Lakes District. It was lovely to be in the family home and work in the garden and enjoy a walk on the fells with my brother and friends. We did look into moving back to England, as my father could definitely do with some help in the house and garden, but Ron would miss out on the full benefit of his pension, which is not practical with only a few more years to go before his retirement. After discussions with my father we are staying put, and if he has had enough of living in the big family home he is open to moving over to Australia. A yearly trip to the UK will help to keep maintenance jobs in the house and garden under control and Thomas visits regularly to help with the garden. When we retire several months in the UK each year will definitely be in order.

A major event this year was me turning 50!..! received a boogie board from Ron as I took up surfing last year and needed my own board to stop depriving the children of theirs! I didn't have a party as I felt too worn out from the heavy work schedule, though we may have a 51st party instead.! However we will concentrate on the Christmas celebrations first. Lilian is singing in the school choir for Carols by Candlight this week. She is in a school concert, dance concert, and will have the swimming carnival and end of year swimming party before the school term ends. We have no organised plans for the 6 week school holiday, but plan to go camping with friends for some of the time..

Another irrelavency !...

A quote now for our "free trader" masters in Canberra, who recently made dairying an unprofitable calling for most Australian dairy farmers....also for the "Global Village" exponents...

5. Apology to The National Archives..

Earlier this year I had a 'phone call from a **Mr. Doug. Potts** who works for the National Archives and is based in Brisbane. He said that he had read in our Newsletter No.13 a comment about the National Archives which was incorrect. In the passage referred to I said...

"Lu Rees O.A.M. M.B.E. (1891-1983) (E499..Line 6) had deposited a lot of her historical material with the National Archives in Canberra (?? I'm not sure if that's the correct name but that's the impression I got!) and was very dissatisfied with the result..People wishing to view the material (including herself) had an extremely difficult task getting permission to view it...In the latter years of her life she deposited no more material there.."

Mr. Potts told me that it couldn't have been the National Archives as they do not store family historical material and confine their activities to data of National or Political importance.

Please accept my apologies Mr. Potts...! should have checked with John Rees first!. It was the National Library that John referred to...
