1. Firstly please accept my apology for it being such a long time since the last Newsletter in October 2002. The delay has been primarily caused by the drought and the effect it has had on my available free time and energy. In any case not much water has passed under the bridge since October, and everybody knows that that is how time is measured!! The drought has been very bad but now I see where some people in ABARE are saying it's over. They ought to abandon their office chairs somewhere on the coast, for a day or two, and have a look on the inland side of the Great Dividing Range where most of Australia's food and mineral wealth is generated. Unfortunately the drought is still not over for most rural areas. We did have good rain here in December and the odd fall since, but the Big Dry seems to be again exerting it's grip.

Another factor is that not long after our Armidale reunion, **Merron** (our publisher and my assistant) was diagnosed with ovarian cancer and underwent major surgery in late December 2002. Subsequently she returned home with **Bryan** but has had to endure a course of radiotherapy which has not been overly pleasant!! She is still recovering at home in **Caloundra** and has been busy organising a venue for our next Queensland Regional Meeting which is a good sign. Unfortunately she now has neuropathy of the fingers from the chemotherapy and has had to cease her activities as publisher for this **N**ewsletter. I am in the process of trying to line up someone else to take over her responsibilities in this area..

Compared to **Merron's** problems my own seem to have been very small beer !! My major problem has been the drought and the battle to get my small breeding herd of Angus beef cattle through it more or less intact. Just before Xmas last I did manage to get some emails away to some of those members with an email address, and I think the best way to convey the message properly is to reproduce some of them here...

My own activities are almost wholly involved in battling this drought. The Xmas Newsletter I was hoping to get out

is just another casualty of the drought I'm afraid...

We have a total of about 560 acres here but it is mostly hilly,rough and timbered..ideal habitat for kangaroos and wallaroos. We've been running a small breeding herd of Angus cattle for the past 35 years and this is by far the most severe test so far...! sold off all the older breeding cows and kept just 15.. (plus 7 calves) and decided that I could get these through by irrigating a small area of the lower country which has some improved pasture...So I bustled about and enlarged the irrigated area but was disappointed at the amount of feed being grown...I have 2 irrigated paddocks.. the one in front of the house and one adjoining it where the pump and bore is located.. (We are blessed with a wonderful underground water supply...a permanent 2000gph from one bore and 4000gph from the other.) The plan was to graze one off while spelling the other.. Well I was spelling the one in front of the house (well from the cows anyway) and came home at about 9.30 from my usual Saturday night out, at the Nemingha, and there were about 50

kangaroos happily munching away on my paltry 2 acres of greenfeed!! I knew then I had to either shoot every roo within 25 miles of the place, or fence them out..

Three or four weeks prior to this I had got permission from Nat. Parks and Wildlife to shoot some roos...Got in a very good professional roo-shooter..He came 2 nights..I went with him the 1st night and was very impressed at his expertise..Head shot every time..Instant death to the roo..far more humane than an abbattoir..He took about 70 of the bigger ones and I thought my roo troubles were over..So I called him again after the Sat. night mentioned above, but apart from the fact that we had no more Nat.Pk.tags..he was caught up in firefighting (he's the local fire captain)... so I was on my own..Decided then to fence the roos out of about 25 acres of the lower country which includes the house and the 2 irrigable areas...

Been at the fencing now for about 5 weeks and while I don't kid myself that I've got them beaten...I only saw 4 big eastern greys on the irrigable area last night...I'm quite sure they jumped in but there were no "creepie crawlies" inside last night..The "creepie crawlies" are what I call the roos which go through the fences...and this is about 90% of them...I've got a 5000volt wire about 15" above the ground on the outside of the existing fence and that certainly seems to have discouraged them..

I suppose I could just give up...sell the place and really retire but I don't want to do that..I don't know if you remember Reeve Waugh..he was a wonderful fellow and I remember talking to him several years ago...we were discussing Rosemary Waugh and her dogged efforts to hold onto Taloumbi Station..(the cattle property near the mouth of the Clarence where my mother grew up with 5 siblings and 6 cousins)..I asked Reeve (he was Rosemary's 1st cousin) what he thought was Rosemary's motivation..Reeve said "with Rosemary...Taloumbi's not an economic thing...it's a spiritual thing.." and I guess it's the same with me and "Pindari"...I can think of no other explanation!.. And another one...

Just a note to say it looks like my Xmas Newsletter is going to be another casualty of the drought...I've been getting up early...about 6am and working on these roo proof? fences until it gets too hot.. (about 11am) then start again about 6pm and go till dark...Can't seem to get my mind working on anything else at the moment other than how to beat these b's of kangaroos...Philip Ruddock gets it easy...All he's got to do is keep the illegal migrants out of Australia...He ought to try something REALLY difficult like keeping roos off the only green patch in these drought stricken hills...But as I said to you and Bryan when you were here..."I enjoy solving problems" but of course at the time I didn't realise just how big a problem this "exclude the roos" problem was going to be..

On a more cheerful note..Ruth has taken off in her car for a weeks holiday at the coast..(Sawtell) with acouple of friends she has met at the local "Clubhouse" (specially catering for people with disabilitys of all sorts.) and the nicest part of the deal is that Dargie is now here with ME for a week..Just the 2 of us!! First time for about 6 years..so a little chink of light at the end of the tunnel.

The program followed the format of previous years..

Friday Night.. The week-end started with an informal get-together in the Bistro of the Bowling club at about 6.30 on the Friday night.. This was a very happy start for the week-end with about 25 members attending for pre-dinner drinks and a "shout yourself" meal from the kitchen. Because I let the management know in advance, they gave us the use of a small function room which worked better than in previous years.

**Saturday Morning...** we had the use of the Bowling Club's function room from 9.30am for Registrations and name tags etc.. **Pauline** and **Arthur** again set up the Produce Table and those members bringing memorabillia put them on display..Lunch was a "Do-it-yourself" affair some electing to go back to their motels while other stayed on for lunch at the Bistro..

**Saturday Afternoon...** At 2.30pm we had our **Bi-Annual meeting.** quite a good roll up with about 25 there...Various matters were discussed as follows...

....Possibility of getting Neville Maloney's Waugh History onto a website known to Yolande James...I've contacted Neville and he's quite happy to see this done and will assist in the process..Quite a lot of work is involved and as yet I haven't been inundated with offers to do this !! .... Denise and Bevan Stansbie were there all the way from Roma and Bevan volunteered to make a presentation after the dinner that night on the results of their researches into the history of the William WAUGH branch of the family..(See later report on the dinner)

.... Venues for future Regional and Bi-Annual meetings were next discussed..The Armidale meetings have been reasonably successful but numbers have been declining.. Some members (Merron for one!) believed that a venue enabling members to have a short holiday as well as attending the AWFS meeting, might be more oriented towards a coastal venue..Bevan and Denise then put it to the meeting that Roma might be a good place for the next Bi-Annual meeting and offered to organise it if the members so desired..Quite a bit of discussion took place but when eventually a vote was taken as to whether we should carry on with Armidale as our Bi-Annual site or change it, the vote was strongly in favour of maintaining the status quo and holding the next Bi-Annual meeting in Armidale in 2004..

.... The **Regional Meetings** to be held in October 2003 were also discussed and while **Clontarf Reserve** seemed to be generally accepted as the right place for the **Sydney regional meeting**there was more discussion about the **Queensland meeting**. With our Queensland members now

seemingly getting concentrated in the **Sunshine Coast** area, it does seem that a venue there next October would be well received by our Queensland members ...**Merron Matthews** has been looking into this and just to-day I received an email from her with details...see later in this NL......**Financial Report...** I reported to the meeting that the Society is in a strong financial position..We presently have almost \$2000 in the account at the local Northern Inland Credit Union.. **Saturday Night...**We met at 6.30 for pre-dinner drinks...had a smorgasbord style meal and then had our 3 speakers for the night..

Our **first speaker** was **Chris Vaughan** who made a presentation on the life and times of his Aunt Chris., **Chris Honeyman** who was really our first Australian Waugh Family Historian...Chris V. has vivid personal memories of his **Aunt Chris** and proceeded to deliver a fascinating insight into this remarkable woman, and **Waugh Family historian...I** regard his presentation as so important to anyone interested in Waugh family history (and that means all of our members !!) that I intend reproducing Chris's presentation in a future Newsletter of it's own as It's too long to include here.

Many of our members at the Armidale meeting received copies there but many other members who weren't there, should have a copy..So I won't dwell on Chris's presentation that night other than to say "Many thanks Chris" for your wonderful presentation, when you "brought to life" a person and a personality, who had previously been for me anyway..a fairly dim historical figure in my Waugh ancestry..This is no longer true...the "dimness" has disappeared and "Aunt Chris" is to my mind now a much clearer personage and character...Well done Chris!!

Our second speaker was one of our younger "G" generation members. Anne Rix, a daughter of our "Goondowindi" John Waugh and wife Jenny... Anne spoke of her new job in Armidale, with an organisation which finds employment for people with disabilitys .. At times serious, and at times humorous, Anne held her audience's attention very well and gave us all an insight to this most worthwhile aspect of Australia's current workforce and the part being played by a Waugh descendant... Not a job that I could handle, but thank God there are people such as Anne who can.. Our daughter Ruth who has had to battle with a rather serious disability, for the past 20 odd years, really appreciated Anne's presentation and had a good long chat to her afterwards..

Our third speaker was Bevan Stansbie who spoke of the research he and his wife Denise have done into the ancestors and descendants of Denise's grandmother, Alison Elizabeth Talbot WAUGH (1878-1971) (my D338)...Alison is on this Society's Line 3 (Mt.McKenzie Waughs...Nancy Fox's Line )...She was a daughter of John Oxley WAUGH (1847-1926) and a grand-daughter of "Aussie" William WAUGH (1808-1854) and his wife Frances (nee Thorpe-Oxley)..(Frances's grave at Tenterfield was recently renovated through the organising efforts of Nancy Fox, the co-ordinating efforts of this Society, and the financial support of the Hedley family..)

Bevan and Denise produced two genealogical charts..one showing Alison's 150 (approx) descendants and the other tracing her Waugh side ancestry back to a **Thomas Waugh** born in 1630 at Gordon in Berwickshire..These charts are too big to reproduce here but they are pinned to the wall at the end of our lounge room!! They also researched the ancestors of Alison's grandmother Frances, and her father John Oxley...This tree goes way back to Nicholas St. John who was born in 1526 and died in 1589 ..Congratulations must go to them both for their efforts in pushing back the frontiers of our Waugh family history, these extra generations..

## 3. Proposed Queensland Regional Reunion..5th October 2003..

Following is a copy of an email from **Merron** which gives details of our proposed Queensland Regional Meeting..

Dear Ron

I let Ian & Shirley Waugh know that I thought it might be a good idea to have the Qld/Nth NSW reunion in Caloundra. They think that is a good idea. Of course, any member (including you!) or prospective member who wants to come is welcome. (I could put a little advertisement in the

Courier Mail if you want to recruit at the same time! People could ring me for details.) The venue is tentatively booked for 5th October. It has Insurance.

The hall I am proposing (subject to satisfactory arrangements being made for public risk insurance.) is the Caloundra Arts Centre Assn building on the corner of Landsborough Parade and North St, opposite the Oasis Resort. This is easily found because one turns right opposite the landmark Sunland Shopping Centre, into Landsborough Parade off Caloundra Rd (which is the main road in to Caloundra from the Bruce Highway) and almost instantly right again into the carpark. Advantages of this venue, not in any order:

- a.. It is very light and bright.
- b.. It is within walking distance of a swimming beach and the Sunland Shopping Centre ( to buy forgotten food & drinks, ice-cream etc).
  - c.. It has a large parking lot.
  - d.. It has inside/covered outside area and a large grassed space.
  - e. There is a fully equipped kitchen and toilets. We can self-cater and bring our own food.
  - f.. There are plenty of comfortable chairs and tables.
  - g.. Cost per hour is \$12.10; count 6 hours = \$72.60 ..
- h. Close enough to catchment area for most to drive home after the event, OR very out-of-towners could ask SC residents for offer of home accommodation for the night; otherwise there is plenty of off-season accommodation available, being the last day of the Qld school holidays.
- i.. Some people might consider combining the reunion with a holiday or weekend away.
- j.. There is a Sunday market on Caloundra road if people want to come earlier. Possible Disadvantages (not to me):
- a.. No alcohol allowed..
- b.. Last day of the Qld school holidays (could be an advantage).
- c.. Self-catering..
- d.. We clean up and leave place as we found it.

I think that we could be 'open for business' from 10.00am to 3.30pm and have cleaned up and left by 4pm. People can come and go as they wish.

Lillian finishes her first year at Newcastle Grammar School tomorrow with a speech day to be held at the University of Newcastle. She has had a marvellous year having made some very good friends, represented the school by swimming at the Olympic pool in Sydnet earlier in the year and has done very well academically. She sings in two school choirs and plans to do percussion and drama next year.

Lillian was also a finalist in the annual Northcott Society for Children with Disability Christmas Card competition. Her entry was one of 192 chosen out of 1100 cards...We went down to Sydney last week-end for the presentation and to look at the exhibition..

I have enclosed a brief summary of his ancestors.. Although I am still waiting on some documentation for proof of details I think it is close to the truth but will obviously verify the information as the paper work is received...

I would appreciate any help and information that you or the members of the group can provide..Thank You... **Penny Waugh**..

Ed..The genealogical data sent by Penny shows that Darrel is descended from a William WAUGH born on 12th July 1802 in Kirklinton, Cumberland England..He married Sarah FOX, daughter of John FOX and Elizabeth FURNASS..born ca 1826 in Plumbland, Cumberland, England..(?)

They had the following children:

- 1. **Thomas...**born ca 1859 in Ellenborough, Cumberland, England..Thomas died in Fairy Meadow, NSW, Australia on 30 Jun 1937, he was 78.
- 2. Joseph (ca 1861-1931)
- 3. Andrew born ca 1867 in Aspatria, Cumberland, England. He died in Woonona, NSW Aust. on 23 Feb. 1933, he was 66.

Andrew married Eliza Jane MONTGOMERY.

4. Henry. born ca 1873 nin Gilcrux, Cumberland, England...

Many thanks Penny for your letter and sub.. Your letter raises some very interesting questions regarding the future of this Society.. Like you I couldn't find any recent "Common Ancestor" which would link Darrel's ancestor William to those known to our Society... "William" is a fairly common name among the Waughs. Our 2 best known "Williams" are "Wealthy" William... 1788-1866 and "Aussie" William... 1808-1854... With Darrel's ancestor William being born in 1802 it is highly likely that he was a cousin of our "Aussie" William... 1st 2nd or 3rd cousin once or twice removed... who knows ?? As Reeve WAUGH used to say "They're still "COUSINS" Ron!! Don't worry about the details!!

In the early days of this Society (1997) **Neville Maloney** discovered that there are over 700 WAUGHS listed as having a telephone service...For every descendant called WAUGH there would be probably more than 20 with a different surname..(me for one!)

I said earlier that I could find no **recent** common ancestor, but if we go back further in time I believe we can.. A very believable family legend (reproduced in Neville Maloney's book) is that the Waugh family originated in the 8th century when a Dane, **Valdemaa Waa**, took part in a raid on Britain in the Border country..killed a farmer then married his daughter and settled down!! There are a few mysteries about this story and not much detail (eg. did he really **marry** the daughter? if he did, then he must have been one of the better behaved Vikings!!) So **Darrel** and myself and all the Waugh descendants in Australia and New Zealand almost certainly DO have a **common ancestor..Valdemaa Waa..** 

Until now, our Society members have all been descendants of **Thomas WAUGH** 1706-1783 and **Margaret**JOHNSTONE but I see no reason why other descendants of old **Valdemaa** shouldn't also be members. One of our
members **Edith van Driel** (see later) is also a member of the "Clan Johnston/e" Association and sent me a copy of
one of their Newsletters..It is a very large Association, and while I don't believe the Waugh descendants are as
numerous as the Johnstons, I can see the possibility of a much bigger Waugh Society than we have now, catering for
ALL **descendants** of **Valdemaa** and not just those of our Thomas (1706-1783)..

So a big welcome to our new members Darrel and Penny WAUGH!!

From Edith van Driel (G377) (nee Oakes)...Croydon 3136...

Ed....Edith sent me a copy of a quarterly issue of the Newsletter of the Clan Johnston/e Association which contained extracts from the memoirs of William Napier Reeve WAUGH (1853-1945) originally published in Chris Honeyman's history and reproduced in Neville Maloney's Waugh History..Edith had previously asked my permission to use the material which I was happy to give on behalf of our Society provided the source was acknowledged..This was duly done in the Clan Johnston/e Newsletter and it is good to see this valuable historic material being given wider dissemination..The Waughs and the Johnston/es have been marrying each other at least since the early 1700's in England and of course "Aussie" Alexander's daughter of his first marrige..Eliza Annie Isobella Grieve Waugh married James Johnston at Bungay Bungay on 23/4/1858..They had 5 children and in 1996 when I was compiling lists of descendants we knew there were at least 337 of them. Edith, who is a descendant of Eliza Annie also sent me a copy of a poem written by Frank Oakes (G375) at Kempsey about 1987..

In My Shoes.....by Frank Oakes...

So you want to be a farmer, I said to my lad, He said, too right I want to be, Just like you Dad.

So I looked him up and down, And stared straight at my kid, I wondered quietly to myself, Is he the full Quid?

#### **Arthur Gordon LONGSTON**

Arthur was born 18 December 1918 at Prahan VIC and educated at Ripponlea State .school, then Elwood Central School and later Melbourne High School. His first job was in cabinet manufacturing, and then he went to Wondoflex Textiles PL, Gardenvale where he was promoted to the rank of foreman in the knitting department. He then moved to the Government Gun Turret plant at Heidelberg making gun turrets for the Australian Beaufort Bombers.

In 1944 he joined the RAAF, completed an instrument makers course at Ultimo Technical College in Sydney, and was then posted to Darwin 4RSU working on Liberator Bombers until 1946.. While doing his Tech course at Ultimo, he met a beautiful girl at a dance at Wynns in Oxford Street, Sydney and married **Pauline ROBINSON** on 26 April 1947 at St Matthews Church in The Corso, Manly, NSW. They continued to live at Manly then moved to Melbourne for two years. They later returned to live at Watson's Bay, then Bankstown and finally Greenacre in 1956.

In Sydney, Arthur worked at the Sun Newspaper for 32 years before retiring to become one of their Official Visitors (CO) to other Fairfax retirees.

Donald Philip Smeed SMITH...b. 1917..d. 3/4/2003.. Sadly I must report the death of my sister Mollie's husband, and my brother-in-law Phil Smith. Phil was 86 when he died and though death is never an easy thing to accept, when the time comes to depart this mortal coil, very few of us are granted the sort of departure achieved by Phil. He had always been exceptionally healthy but a couple of days before he died, he was feeling a bit "off colour" and made one of his rare visits to a doctor. He got some pills and carried on at home for a couple of more days, then on the night of Thursday 3rd April, he went to sleep in his own bed, and didn't wake up next morning.. Mollie was unable to wake him...I can't help feeling that such an end to one's life is a just reward, reserved for saints or heroes...I don't think Phil would've liked me to call him a saint, but he certainly was a hero..Phil was a pilot in the RAF during World War 2 and was decorated with the DFC for his efforts..When Hitler was threatening to impose his heinous "people management" schemes on the world. Phil was one of those modern day heroes, who helped preserve the freedoms we enjoy today...Phil was shot down over France..rescued and hidden by a French family...eventually escaped back to England and resumed his career in the RAF. In recent years Mollie's son by her first marriage, and Phil's stepson. Michael Anderson, went to France and stayed with this family, who are still very appreciative of the efforts of Australian servicemen in liberating France in WW2.

**Phil's** working life was spent with the CSR in the sugar industry initially as a chemist then in later years in an administrative position in marketing. He married **Mollie** in Condong northern **N**SW on

8/10/1949...They had three sons but lost the eldest one tragically in a surfing accident many years ago..Their two surviving sons are **James Elliott-Smith** of Toowoomba and **Kit Smith** of Burleigh Heads Q..

Phil's funeral was at Neutral Bay and was very well attended. Many Society members were there all of whom had a great respect and love for Phil. Phil and Mollie's home at Mosman was a real social centre for many Waugh descendants, (eg.see letter from Bill Talbot) and Phil's generosity and hospitality was widely recognised and appreciated. This Society and the world are poorer for his passing. He is survived by his wife Mollie, stepson Michael Anderson, sons James and Kit and grand-children Mollie Boland-Anderson (14yrs), Ian James Elliott-Smith(20yrs), Michael John Elliott-Smith(18yrs), Carl Lawrence Smith(14yrs) and Lauren Kate - Smith (13yrs)


